





















There's a lot that will be familiar to regular Festival goers in this year's programme alongside with some changes too. For example, we opened our 60th anniversary edition some 6 months earlier than usual in April with a major outdoor spectacular called Cristal Palace featuring a local community cast (see our YouTube channel). This change in approach reflects a series of questions that sit at the heart of this year's very special programme and that examine the current and future nature and role of arts and culture and specifically, arts festivals in contemporary society. Many of these questions will be addressed in the specific context of what is happening in Northern Ireland and the rest of the world: our response to the climate crisis. the challenges of creating a fair and equal society, how best to achieve true cultural diversity and Northern Ireland's place in the world, just to name a few. Equally, we look at the evolving nature of contemporary arts practice and in particular, the growth of interdisciplinary practice that uses more than one artistic discipline to create new work.

An example of another key theme for 2022 – partnership working – is the outdoor exhibition *Irish Craft Heroes*, a collaboration with Design & Crafts Council Ireland, Craft NI and National Museums NI, highlighting 50 years of craft making and makers across the island, which opened in Botanic Gardens at the end of July.

We are honoured to open our autumn season on 5th October at The MAC with the UK premiere of a new play by Frank McGuinness, Dinner With Groucho, With special financial support from the British Council, we are presenting a number of artists and events from North Africa and the Middle East, including Youness Atbane, Shaymaa Shoukry and acclaimed Palestinian artist/performer. Riham Isaac. who brings the world premiere of her new work, Another Lover's Discourse to The MAC. Canadian artists also feature throughout our programme including the bittersweet story of Vivek Shraya's journey through showbiz in How To Fail as a Popstar, a critical look at the world of opera in *The Queen in Me* and the magnificent and powerful Kiinalik: These Sharp Tools, over our closing weekend.

This year's programme includes a new strand of programming that takes a more in depth look at the work of a leading artist or ensemble. Our first Featured Artist is the young rising star of French and European dance, **Noé Soulier** whose works are showcased live and online.

As always, local artists and ensembles form the backbone of the festival and this year is no different with news works and programmes from Oona Doherty, Conor Mitchell, Paul McVeigh, Jan McCullough, Cahoots, Big Telly, Dumbworld and many others.

Our support for Belfast's UNESCO City of Music designation is largely reflected in how music is seen by many of the above artists as an essential component in their interdisciplinary practice. These are supplemented by a series of stand-alone concerts featuring Festival favourites Paul Carrack and Martin Hayes with his new group, the Common Ground Ensemble, both at the Grand Opera House, alongside special concerts and recitals by the Ulster Orchestra, The Staples Jnr Singers, Ruth McGinley, Fews Ensemble, Matt Andersen and IMLÉ with Rójsín Seoighe.

The essence of performance is in its liveness and its uniqueness at any given moment, so please join us throughout this, our 60th year for a rich and unique feast of art and culture that is enlightening as it is entertaining.

Having held the Chairmanship of Belfast International Arts Festival for the past 7 years, my term of office has come to an end and, following this year's AGM, I will be passing the reins to my successor.

In the year of Festival's 60th birthday, it is with great affection and pride that I look back to 2015, when the former Belfast Festival at Oueens was re-formed emerging as Belfast International Arts Festival, with a new Board and a new strategic direction. Whist paving homage to the past Festival at Oueens. it was time to reflect the great changes happening in what is a more outward looking, internationally focussed Belfast that is also attracting an increasing number of Foreign Direct Investment companies as well as international visitors to the region.

Our aims are threefold and embrace principles of equality, excellence and renaissance:

- · to widen the reach and impact, by making Belfast International Arts Festival a festival for all the people of Northern Ireland regardless of age, class, creed or ethnic origin;
- · to expose Northern Ireland audiences to internationally acclaimed artists and art forms that will stretch minds, challenge perceptions and cause us to question personal, sometimes narrow, world views; and,
- · to contribute to the regeneration of Northern Ireland by helping make Belfast an attractive place to live and do business, not just during the month of Festival in October each year but, increasingly, with performances and cultural events peppered throughout the year.

Over the years we have not shied away from important but potentially contentious issues, such as the magnificent Poppies: Weeping Window installation in 2017, with thousands of

Festival audiences will notice how our mainstay programme in the month of October has been augmented to major events peppered throughout the year such as the first major outdoor event post-Covid Cristal Palace with the iconic Titanic Belfast building as a backdrop. A key theme of this year's programme is partnership working and this augmented programme is made possible, and sustainable. through strategic partnering with other festivals and arts organisations across Belfast.

Belfast International Arts Festival would not be possible without the generous support of our core funders Arts Council NI. Belfast City Council. Tourism NI. British Council and the Government of Ireland's Department of Foreign Affairs. We owe them and our many other partners a debt of gratitude for helping to keep the arts and culture alive in our City.

BIAF welcomes leading Moroccan interdisciplinary artist, Youness Atbane and his one off installation/performance of *UNTITLED 14 KM*, exploring how the art world sees and understands contemporary art in its relation with identity, specifically Arab identity. Many Arab artists have experienced the stress and anxiety created by the political realities in their region and many more share a common subject matter, related to the political and social problems resulting from the loss of part of their land.

Youness Atbane's latest performance piece examines this through an enacted dialogue between fictional characters: an Arab-Andalusian poet, a director of the museum of contemporary art, a curator and a contemporary artist.

UNTITLED 14 KM reflects on negotiations, conflicts, competitions and illegitimacy, and how this defines a "contemporary Arab identity" in the art world.

Post-show discussion: Youness Atbane will be joined immediately after the performance by Egyptian dance maker, Shaymaa Shoukry to discuss the arts scene in North Africa.

The Kingdom of Shades – Signe Blanc

The Kingdom of the Shades is the most well-known passage from La Bayadère, the famous ballet by Marius Petipa and Noé uses it as a basis to explore the poetic incongruity of dance and everyday movements in the company of Vincent Chaillet, former Principal Dancer with the Paris Opera Ballet. Continuing into Signe Blanc, Noé and Vincent extend their experimental approach to look at ballet mime vocabulary and the often multiple and contradictory messages between what we hear and what we see.

Portrait of Frédéric Tavernini

Tall, strapping, mature, sculpted, tattooed, Frédéric Tavernini, who has danced for many of the great European choreographers such as Maurice Béjart, Trisha Brown, Mats Ek, William Forsythe and Angelin Preljocaj, occupies the stage with breadth, clarity, concentration, precision; he is revealed, in his life experience and current body, between memories and visions, to the rhythmic notes of a piano that softly touches on Stravinsky, Hindemith, Tchaikovsky, Chopin.

A rare chance to see two amazing dancers up close and personal!

BIAF continues its support of internationally acclaimed local dance maker, Oona Doherty by co-commissioning her most ambitious project to date, *Navy Blue*.

Using her distinctive and visceral choreographic style seen in previous Festival presentations such as *Hard To Be Soft: A Belfast Trilogy* and *Hope Hunt*, Doherty creates an unsettling atmosphere for this new work, presented with special support from Belfast City Council.

A dark night descends and a group of 12 dancers generate a sense of dread, trapped within a destructive algorithm. Doherty uses movement, music and colour to reflect pain and loneliness, and the struggles and exploitation of working class people. Often angry and defiant, Doherty and her dancers ultimately search for a wider communal healing and redemption.

Featuring music from Sergeï Rachmaninoff and Jamie xx this compelling new production considers where we have been and where we are heading, as it urgently calls for societal change.

Navy Blue is a Big Pulse Dance Alliance co-production.

Festival favourite and leading European dance artist, Jan Martens returns to Belfast for the third time following his previously acclaimed visits with *The Dog Days are Over* in 2016 and *Victor* in 2014. On this occasion though we get to see Jan himself perform in his new solo, *Elisabeth Gets Her Way*, a danced portrait of the Polish-born Elisabeth Chojnacka (1939–2017) who was an exceptionally talented and passionate musician who contributed to the revival of harpsichord music in the middle of the twentieth century.

Martens 'plays' his body like Chojnacka played the harpsichord. Different styles of movement are brought together, just as she effortlessly wound her way between registers and genres. 




The artist Jamie Reid is an iconoclast, anarchist, punk, hippie, trouble-making rebel and romantic.

Taking Liberties! is a rare opportunity to see some of Jamie Reid's original works that not only established an entire counter-cultural visual aesthetic for the late 20th Century but also continues to be central to protest movements today.

A series of large-scale, enigmatic images will appear around the Queen's University campus. Depictions of machines and spaces that no longer exist, but that at one time were crucial to the working life of Belfast and provided the city with its rhythms and atmosphere, will be found as sculptural installations in unexpected places.

The exhibition is accompanied by a public programme of events, including a tour on Saturday 15 October at 2pm and an event organised in collaboration with Seamus Heaney Centre on Friday 28 October.

Fragments (2022) is a new short film by BIAF Featured Artist, Noé Soulier and explores movement when it is confronted with the framing of the camera lens.

The particular spaces that the camera frame creates, according to its height and dimensions, enables aspects of movement which would otherwise be invisible onstage to be explored. Thus, the audience is able to see a level of detail, in the articulation of the different parts of the body and in the superposition of the dancers, which do not exist during an onstage representation due to the single viewpoint which it offers.

It is this ability to visually isolate certain parts of the body, laden with multiple effects that Fragments aims to show. both on and off-camera.

A box office smash in Japan with its young audience, it was an event, a generational marker, and a much-revived classic.



Embrace

Embrace is Belfast International Arts Festival's on-going programme of public engagement and professional development activities and events and is aimed at involving communities and groups throughout the city and across the festival programme.

The events in Embrace are designed to both encourage active participation in the arts and to enhance audience enjoyment and understanding of specific productions and events presented in the programme. They include free performances and events, and active creative learning activities such as workshops, performance opportunities and artist talks. As an inclusive organisation, we actively encourage and welcome diverse communities of interest and place to access and participate in these programmes.

Reflecting the vital importance of this programme strand, we opened our 60th anniversary edition in April with a major, free outdoor event called *Cristal Palace*. Featuring professional dancers and musicians alongside a community cast dancing and singing beneath a gigantic chandelier, thousands of spectators enjoyed an open-air ballroom complete with an airborne orchestra, aerial acrobats and sharp-witted characters. As with so much of this year's programme, *Cristal Palace* was presented by BIAF in association with a range of partners, on this

occasion including Belfast City Council, Circusful, Maritime Belfast Trust and Titanic Belfast and you can hear what our community cast felt about the experience in a short documentary on our website and YouTube channel.

At the centre of this year's Embrace programme is a range of professional development workshops with acclaimed international artists sharing their skills and experience with young local talent. Following an earlier workshop in April led by Australian choreographer, Nick Power, featured visiting artists that have agreed to participate in this free programme in October include Inuk artist Laakkuluk Williamson Bathory and queer theatre-maker Evalyn Parry from Kiinalik: These Sharp Tools; Opera singer and interdisciplinary artist Teiya Kasahara 管原 貞野 from The Queen in Me; interdisciplinary artist, Riham Isaac from Another Lover's Discourse and dance makers, ليه خلتني احيك Shaymaa Shoukry and Noé Soulier.

There will also be a series of very special talks and discussions around contemporary arts practice including an "in conversation" on songwriting from the award-winning Paul Carrack



(who plays the Grand Opera House on 26th October), a panel discussion featuring Shaymaa Shoukry and Youness Atbane on current trends in artistic practice in North Africa, and an "in conversation" on the nature of cultural leadership with Noé Soulier, Artistic Director of the National Contemporary Dance Centre in Angers, France.


